

Queen's Cup Finish

Jason Bemis' Peerless finished the race with a time of 08:54:35. George Greubling's Off-Piste finished with a time of 9:42:10. It was a foggy and light start to the 2021 Queen's Cup in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. It's not unusual that the lake delivers dense fog – local sailors have grown used to navigating it as the summer storms roll over the Great Lakes. The fleet was kept ashore a few hours under postponement as the Race Committee waited for the fog to clear. 132 boats took part in the annual race across the lake, which has different finishing locations every year. This year, Muskegon, Michigan hosted the finish.

There was a stationary front that was hanging out in the middle of the lake between Milwaukee and Muskegon, which was responsible for the fog and the light and variable conditions. It was an overall light race – with the average wind anywhere from 2-18 knots. If foggy and light wasn't enough – add in rain. A trifecta! Thunderstorms and rain soaked the fleet until sunrise when it finally let up and the wind filled in from the South.



The overall winner of this year's Queen's Cup was Thunderstruck, a Farr60 from Racine Yacht Club owned and skippered by Rick Hennig. Like most of the fleet, the

crew from Thunderstruck have been sailing the Queen's Cup most of their lives – and a lot of them together. Rick Hennig himself has done 40. The Queen's Cup is a race that is sailed with family, introduces young sailors to distance racing, and it is an iconic start to the US summer for locals and international crews.

The range in crews is what makes the local club's biggest race of the year so special. Throughout the fleet you can find fully professional paid crews to family programs and junior sailors from around the Midwest. More often than not, they'll be racing against each other! It is a special way to bring an international group to the club and advance overnight sailing skills.

After the finish, crews enjoyed lunch and a celebratory drink (or two...or three!) at the Muskegon Yacht Club as the grill fired up. Muskegon sits on a sugar sand beach, where had it been a touch warmer and sunnier, the sailors would have taken a quick nap before heading out. After drying out and celebrating, the fleet sets off again. Home ports are scattered all over Lake Michigan – some boosted back to the Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, or Michigan shore.

Race to Mackinac

Chicago, Ill. (July 21, 2021) – The Chicago Yacht Club's 112th Race to Mackinac presented by Wintrust was a slow race along its 289.4 nautical mile course from Chicago to Mackinac Island, with primarily upwind wind angles that saw the breeze going from decent at the starts to completely dead at some points near the Manitou Islands, offering windless holes that stranded some of the fleet's 231 boats longer than others.

"We didn't get to race last year (because of the pandemic), but this year we got to sail twice as long," joked one of the 3000 or more sailors that started racing either in Cruising Division on Friday (July 16) or in all other Divisions on Saturday (July 17).

The iconic race, the oldest annual freshwater distance race in the world, starts from the Chicago Lighthouse off Navy Pier and ends at Round Island Lighthouse off Mackinac Island. This year, it was indeed longer in the sense that the bulk of the fleet finished Monday night (July 19) and early Tuesday morning (July 20), with some arriving in just enough time to take a shower and grab a nap before Tuesday's afternoon awards party.

"The forecast was for it to be a very tactical race, and it didn't disappoint," said Race Chair Martin Sandoval. "Were there times the competitors wanted to see more



wind? Yes. But they recognize there is a mental challenge to adapting a plan as you go to meet the conditions. Once the wind filled in from the west (after the Manitou Islands), folks in the Mackinac Straights made it in two hours to the bridge. It mixed up the results for sure; there were some different names in the winner's circle."

At stake were bragging rights in 20 "sections" (otherwise known as classes) for Cruising, Racing, One-Design, Multihull and Doublehanded boats and the glory that comes with winning overall in the Cruising and Racing Divisions, the latter category further divided into those sailing for the prestigious Chicago-Mackinac Trophy and those sailing for the similarly coveted Mackinac Cup.

First to finish just before midnight (Chicago time) on Sunday (July 18) was Eagle One with Timothy LaRiviere (Grosse Pointe, Mich.) at the helm. The Andrews 65, which also finished first overall in Cruising and first in Cruising 1, outpaced the largest boat in the fleet, Peter Thornton's 104' Bruce King-designed ketch Whitehawk, which finished next, around 9:15 the following morning.

Transpac 2021

Hook Race

The HOOK Race is a 189 nautical mile race on Lake Michigan held each year in July. This year's race was held on July 24th. The challenging event starts outside the harbor in Racine, Wisconsin, "hooking" through Death's Door, a narrow and often treacherous passageway between Washington Island and Wisconsin's Door County Peninsula, continuing across Green Bay, and ending in Menominee, Michigan.

Jason Bemis' Peerless (PHRF 1 Division) finished the race on July 25th at 13:41:53 with an elapsed time of 1:03:51:53 and a corrected time of 1:03:23:32 achieving 5th in class and 10th in



fleet. The Peerless crew included Lauren Bemis, Eileen English, Whitney Kent, Tom Pease, Tye Rubin and Ross Whitlock



Mark Wessel's Runaway (PHRF 3 Division) finished the race on July 25 at 19:59:04 with an elapsed time of 1:10:29:04 and a corrected time of 1:04:48:52 to win 2nd in class and 16th in fleet. The Runaway crew included Sam Delasanta, Dan Kerpe, Jason Diener and Dave Bronson.



National Marine Sanctuary in Lake Michigan

On June 22, the NOAA announced the designation of a 962-square-mile area of Wisconsin's Lake Michigan as a national marine sanctuary. Such sanctuaries are protected waters that include important habitats and, in cases like this one, archeological sites.

"Preserving this region furthers the Biden-Harris Administration's vision of locally-led, collaborative conservation," said Secretary of Commerce Gina M. Raimondo. "This designation is also an exciting opportunity for the public to celebrate and help protect this piece of our nation's rich maritime history."

The Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast National Marine Sanctuary will protect 36 historically significant shipwrecks and related maritime heritage resources, 21 of which are listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Wellpreserved by Lake Michigan's cold, fresh water, several of the known shipwrecks are essentially intact and look much like they did when they sank. The area also includes Wisconsin's two oldest known shipwrecks, and archival research suggests there may be dozens more yet to be discovered.

Spanning the early 1800s through the 20th century, the shipwrecks represent a cross-section of vessel types that played critical roles in transforming the Great Lakes from a maritime frontier into the nation's busiest waterway. The ships carried grain and raw materials east as other vessels traveled west loaded with coal, manufactured goods, and settlers.


"The designation of this sanctuary is a milestone for NOAA, Wisconsin, and the nation," said Nicole LeBoeuf, acting director of NOAA's National Ocean Service. "This new sanctuary opens the door to world-class research, educational opportunities, and tourism for generations to come."

NOAA and the state of Wisconsin will co-manage the sanctuary. The sanctuary designation will take effect following 45 days of continuous session of the U.S. Congress after publication of this action in the Federal Register.

"We're really excited about NOAA's announcement," said Wisconsin Governor Tony Evers. "The designation builds on 30 years of maritime heritage preservation by the State of Wisconsin and will create exciting new opportunities in education, recreation, and tourism in our coastal communities." "I worked to support state and local efforts on the nomination of this area of Lake Michigan as a new national marine sanctuary and together we are getting the job done," said U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin of Wisconsin. "Our Wisconsin Shipwreck Coast National Marine Sanctuary will protect and preserve historic sites, bring new opportunities for research, and boost our local tourism economy. I am thankful for all the hard work that has gone into this effort in Wisconsin, as I am to have the Biden Administration being a partner that is committed to carrying on the strong Wisconsin tradition of protecting our Great Lakes."

The area was nominated for national marine sanctuary consideration by a diverse coalition of organizations and individuals at local, state, regional and national levels. This included elected officials, historical societies, businesses, museums, and environmental, recreational, conservation, tourism and educational groups. Principal cities involved in the nomination include Port Washington, Sheboygan, Manitowoc, and Two Rivers.

This is the most recent sanctuary designation since the protection of Mallows Bay, Maryland, about 40 miles south of Washington, D.C. in 2019.

Sea Scouts

We started our summer season in June with five scouts. Some of those scouts invited friends and they invited more friends to the point that by the second week in July we now have ten scouts active in our sailing program. The last Monday night we did not have enough of our own Lasers for all of the scouts that showed up, so we launched three Youth Sailing 420's.

We've been doing a lot of work on the Sea Scout garage in the last few weeks to address the water leakage problem. Every time it rains water leaks in along the north side where the wall meets the garage floor. To start with we had a rain gutter installed. We also opened up the walls on the inside of the north/east corner and found the sill plate was completely rotted away. We installed a new sill plate made of treated lumber and tied it into the existing studs. Additionally, we removed the bottom course of vinyl siding & foam board on the north side and found some rot starting on the entire north side sill plate also. We installed ³/₄" plywood over the removed foam board and covered the plywood with a heavy fiberglass membrane.




As you can see the photo above, we finished by having asphalt installed up to the garage wall and pitched away for proper drainage. – Mark

Name that Knot

A Zeppelin bend (also known as the Rosendahl Bend) is an end-to-end joining knot formed by two symmetrically interlinked overhand knots. It is stable, secure, and highly resistant to jamming. It is also resistant to the effects of slack shaking and cyclic loading.





