



Then I got off the boat in front of Hawaii Yacht Club my wife Dawn asked me if I would do it again. At that point it was a solid "don't ask me that yet, I'm not so sure. That was tough". At that point the lack of sleep for 7 days, being wet practically the entire time, marginal food, hot stuffy stinky conditions inside the boat, and pretty constant hard physical work was still fresh in my mind. But so were the days of sailing downwind in 18-25 knots of wind and 10+ foot waves surfing and planing regularly to speeds over 20 knots.

And so was being part of a group of 10 people that came together into a cohesive unit by the end of the race able to pull of gybes in 25 knots during the night. Brothers for life. Making landfall as the sun came up and blasting down the Molokai channel the last 30 miles to the finish was something I'll never forget. It was simply the most incredible sailing I have ever done. Now that two months have gone by the tough parts seem to slowly fade and the good parts remain strong in my mind. I understand now why they hold this race every two years...that must be enough time to totally forget about how miserable you were during the last race and be dumb enough to do it again!

The Transpac experience depends heavily on the type of boat you are on. The boat I sailed on, Callisto, is a Pac 52. Pac 52's were designed to go fast downwind, perfect for this race. The boat is quite light for its size and very

powerful. Half of the boat's weight is in the keel bulb. It's essentially a 52 foot planing offshore dinghy:

LOA (max): 15.85m (52ft) Beam (max): 4.5m (14ft 9in) Draught (max): 3.6m (11ft 9in)

Displacement (min): 6,900kg (15,200lb) Sail area (upwind max): 171m2 (1,840ft2) Asymmetric (max): 272m2 (2,927ft2)

There are no creature comforts inside the Callisto. Inside the boat is black carbon, even white paint weighs too much for this type of boat. There are 5 pipe berths on each side for sleeping. At the foot of the companionway stairs there are two Jet boil burners for heating water for our freeze dried food or an occasional freeze dried coffee and a small carbon sink. Just in front of the mast is a carbon toilet bowl. The rest of the boat in front of the mast is totally empty. In the back half of the boat are the bunks and a navigation station under the cockpit on centerline. Our navigator sat and slept on a spinnaker. The tradeoff for this lack of comfort and extra weight is speed. We covered the 2,225 mile course in 6 days, 22 hours and averaged over 14 knots. Our max speed was 27 knots.

We split the crew into 4 sets of 2 people. 2 pairs, 4 people were on deck sailing the boat at all times. Every two hours a new pair would come up and one would go down. We were on watch for 4 hours and off watch for



4 hours the entire race. The navigator and owner were on call whenever needed.


While on deck the sailing was intense. One person steering, one on the mainsheet, one on spinnaker sheet, and the fourth on the grinder pedestal trimming the spin sheet. There was never any time off. At times the wave state made it impossible to avoid stuffing the bow in and sending a wall of water back into the cockpit. Twice we punched to bow in so hard that we shredded two spinnakers. We wiped out several times as well. Night watches were mentally draining because obviously you can't see they waves or horizon. All the helmsman has to guide him/her are 7 digital mast displays with

continuously changing numbers. Heading, boatspeed, true wind angle, heel angle and true wind speed are the primary inputs to keep the boat pointed in the right direction and moving fast

During a typical off watch I would go below and peel of my wet (inside and out) foul weather gear and shoes. Then grab a 5 gallon bucket and bail out the boat. We figured we bailed 5 gallons every 2 hours. This type of boat is impossible to keep totally dry inside. Water finds its way through the mast partners, main hatch, and forward hatch. The headstay is made of carbon and goes through the bow to a hydraulic cylinder. This is another place

for water to get in. Next grab some food. Keeping enough calories coming in was challenging. And then finally lay down in a bunk with my nose about 4 inches under the mainsheet winch and try to get some sleep as the boat is bombing along at 20 knots. Wake up, if I was lucky enough to get some sleep, 30 minutes before the next watch. Try to eat something. Put on the still wet foul weather gear, shoes, and safety gear. Head up on deck, rinse and repeat.

Now would I do it again? A definite maybe.





New Weather Buoy Located

Russ Green is the Great Lakes Regional Coordinator for NOAA and the Office of National Marine Sanctuaries. Russ recently sent me a note that with a grant from the Great Lakes Observing System (GLOS), they have installed a weather buoy off the coast of Sheboygan to provide real time wind, wave, and water temperature information at four depths. Additional buoys off Two Rivers and Port Washington will provide data for research in addition to information helping recreational boaters be safer.

Have fun with this new source of information. I would be happy to compile any feedback or ideas you may have for the project and forward them to Russ. While the project is valuable to the science community, a key aim is to provide boaters, divers, surfers, sailors, and fishermen with real time information to help them boat safely.


